The Global Connections Foundation will celebrate the appointment of its first Executive Director on 1 March, 2005. The Board of Directors and the over 200 schools in 47 countries that represent Global Connections worldwide are pleased to welcome Claudia Gallant to that position.

Currently completing her tenure as Vice President for Professional Development for the United States National Association of Independent Schools (NAIS), Claudia has an extraordinary background as a teacher (Phillips Exeter Academy in New Hampshire), an overseas director of School Year Abroad (Barcelona, Spain), and director of Professional development programs for public schools (Fitchburg, Massachusetts).

Claudia is also a world traveler and has recently participated in programs in

Bulgaria, Romania, Russia, and France. In 2003, she was responsible for the annual NAIS conference, which was held "offshore" for the first time in Montreal, Canada. This year's annual conference in San Diego will be her fifth. In addition, Claudia has established a number of institutes, including the first for experienced heads of schools which, understandably, followed her initiatives with the institute for new heads.

Global Connections is pleased to have a witty, wise and farsighted colleague join the Foundation, who together with its board of directors representing five countries, will provide new and vital connections to global initiatives through school leaders worldwide.

GC Visitorship Engages in Second Enlightening Visit

Thanks to Dulany Bennett and her colleagues at the Oregon Episcopal School in Portland, Simona Baciú, the founder of Romania's first independent and not-for-profit school, was able to spend a week's professional visit there learning about Middle School administration and the U.S. middle school curriculum.

This visit was the outcome of Global Connections VIII that met in Bulgaria and Romania last July. Both Dulany and Simona were participants in the seminar.

This visit has also led to the second Visitorship grant from the Global Connections Foundation, which was awarded to Simona so that she might continue her professional development program in the U.S. Arrangements were coordinated with the First Secretary of the Romanian Embassy, Nadia Crisan, who, like Simona, is a native of Cluj in Transylvania.

During a busy week and a half, Simona met with Laura Kang, Middle School Director of the Severn School in Maryland (GCII), with Dick Hall, Head of School, at the Washington International School in the District of Columbia (GCVII), with Fran Carey, Principal of the Evergreen Avenue School in New Jersey (GCVII and GCVIII), and four other New Jersey Principals who were recipients of Geraldine R. Dodge Foundation grants to attend

GCVII or GCVIII. Ross Danis (GCVIII), the Education Program Director of the Foundation, hosted a dinner for Simona in Princeton, New Jersey.

Finally, Simona spent an afternoon at the National Association of Independent Schools in Washington,

meeting with Claudia Gallant (GCVIII), Vice President for Professional Development and Executive Director-elect of the Global Connections Foundation. At NAIS, she also met with Brad Gray, the new Vice President for Global Initiatives.

The various meetings – from Oregon to New Jersey – provided Simona and her developing International School of Cluj with a number of long-term professional contacts. They will be able to assist her and her colleagues in Romania to develop further this remarkable school which has introduced not only the first examples of community service and outreach but also professional development and curricula planning for primary, elementary and now middle school grades in much of Romania.

We are grateful to Dulany Bennett for taking this initiative and thank her and all other Global Connections “alumni” for their input in initiating this second Visitorship program.
